We must examine ourselves and our neighbors to better understand minority students—the expectations they have from writing centers, and the roles they can play within them.


Alone Together: the Challenges of Online Tutoring


But You Have to Go!: The Collaborative Success of Mandatory Visits

Tutor's Perspectives on Online Tutoring



This presentation will discuss different patterns of reported perspectives that the MC Writing Center tutors have on online tutoring. Our goal is to share with other writing centers how MC tutors view online training, and to address the reasons tutors cite for why they have or have not become online tutors. In our conclusion, we will discuss ways in which writing centers can use this information to expand and improve their own online tutoring services.

The "Whiting Center": Combatting Colonial Imperatives in Academia in the Twenty-First Century

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In this essay, I revisit "Postcolonialism and the Idea of a Writing Center" (1999), in which Anis Bawarshi and Stephanie Pelkowski discuss the Writing Center as an extension of an academic system that insists upon "white language" as the solely correct standard for academic English writing. I challenge Bawarshi and Pelkowski's push for a Writing Center that mutually respects indigenous cultures and "proper" academic writing standards, and I argue that Bawarshi and Pelkowki's vision of the postcolonial Writing Center can be achieved only through a critically conscious and visible subversion of an academic system that prioritizes whiteness.

The Use of Outlines at the Mississippi College Writing Center

Writing centers are built on collaboration between tutors and tutees, but it can be a real challenge decide when to contribute and when the tutee should work without further assistance. In my experience, a tool that can help tutors in these situations is outlining. But are outlines effective in helping the tutee? Are they used a lot by tutors? 
